Staff skill upgradation

In September, orthopaedic surgeon Dr Kailash Kadel spent five days with the team of Wishbone Orthopaedics, Ahmedabad, observing their work.

Visiting specialists

On July 2 and 3, visiting urologist Dr Brajesh Singhal was consulted by nine patients and he operated on four patients. Dr Singhal visited again on September 3-4, when he saw 10 patients and operated on six.

Visiting joint replacement surgeon Dr Narayan Khandelwal performed 16 knee replacements during the quarter.

Dr Sunil Mishra, a dermatologist from Mumbai, was consulted by 107 patients on July 27.

The quarter saw a large number of cardiology consultations. Visiting cardiologist Dr Ashish Agarwal saw 18 patients during visits on July 30-31 and on September 25. Another visiting cardiologist Dr Rajkumar Shivnani addressed an audience of 2,000 at Shantivan, Abu Road, on September 28. Over the next two days, he saw nine patients.

On September 14, 13 patients consulted visiting endocrinologist Dr Shivani Sidana. Visiting nephrologist Dr Manjunath saw 19 2 patients on September 23.

New equipment for pathology

In August, the pathology department acquired a fully automated random access

Chemiluminescence's analyser (refurbished) for immunoassays. This machine will test blood for various tumour markers, thyroids, cardiac markers, speciality, virus, infectious diseases, skeletal etc. So far the hospital had been using a semi-automated low-end dry analyzer for certain markers. This was found lacking in robustness and reliability. A semi-automated machine is a reader whereas a fully automated machine processes (aspirates) samples as well as reads parameters.

Caring for the poor Caring for the poor ENT, general surgery, neurosurgery and orthopaedics are the four surgical disciplines at the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital & Research Centre.

Many of the patients availing treatment at the hospital are covered by the Rajasthan government's health insurance scheme for the poor. The department of ENT operated on five such cases between July and September while general surgery saw six cases and the orthopaedics department admitted 28 cases. Poor patients constituted a high percentage of the overall work done by the department of orthopaedics followed by ENT. The total number of ENT admissions was 14, general surgery cases were 72 while the orthopaedics cases numbered 55.

Removing multiple gallbladder stones

A man, aged 58, presented with pain in the abdomen in the right lumbar region. A sonography of the whole abdomen showed he had multiple calculi (stones) in the gallbladder. Dr Anil Bhansali conducted a laparoscopic cholecystectomy on the patient to remove the calculi and the gallbladder.



Nose corrective surgery

A 41-year-old woman had been suffering from a watery discharge from her left eye for four years. Imaging showed that her septum was crooked, or in medical parlance, she had a left deviated nasal septum (bone and cartilage dividing the nose into two nostrils). Dr Kusum Bhansali conducted a nasal septoplasty, a surgical procedure to straighten the septum, and an endoscopic dacryocystorhinostomy (DCR).

Donors at the Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank numbered 1760 over the quarter with 663 units coming from nine donation drives. The largest drive yielded 230 units, this was conducted with the North Western Railway Employees Union and Lions Club Aravali of Abu Road. Another initiative by the staff of J Watumull Global Hospital & Research Centre yielded 87 units, and 71 units were collected at a drive with the BJP Yuva Morcha of Mt Abu. The bank issued 1823 units, 274 for no charges. Sixty six thalassemia patients registered with the bank availed transfusions.

Two staff have been stationed at each of the new centres—an optometrist, to conduct primary examinations, refractions, referrals to the base hospital and record-keeping, and an optical assistant-cum-field worker to operate the optical counter, grind glasses, dispense spectacles, conduct field surveys, etc.

Each of the vision centres will serve a population of about 50,000.
