## World Blood Donors' Day

Blood donation drive organisers and repeat donors were felicitated on World Blood Donors Day (June 14) in June. NGOs and social activist groups that have been associated with creating awareness of the need for safe blood came together to celebrate this years' theme: donating blood is an act of solidarity, join the efforts and save lives. Sanyam Lodha, member of the

legislative assembly from Sirohi, BK Karuna Bhai, the PRO of the Brahma Kumaris, and Dr Ashok Mehta, a renowned oncologist from Mumbai graced the occasion. Trustees Dr Partap Midha and Rashmikant Acharya, and pathologist Dr Sapna Bhandari joined the ceremony. A few donors shared their experience and the donor motivators spoke of the challenges in creating awareness.

## Blood banking

Between April and June, 1409 units of blood were collected at the Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank. Of these units, 38% or 534 came from eight outreach programmes. A blood donation programme organised by the Sarv Samaj Sansthan at Abu Road was the largest drive yielding 164 units.

During the quarter, the blood bank issued 29 units of whole blood, 1594 units of packed cells, 1605 units of fresh frozen plasma, 33 units of platelets and 16 units of cryoprecipitate. The number of beneficiaries was 218.

# Creating health awareness



## Focus on tuberculosis

In the quarter, field workers attached to the Village Outreach Programme collected 50 sputum samples, of which 16 tested positive and 11 patients were found to have extra pulmonary tuberculosis. Thirty patients recovered, eight were referred.

# Reporting from adopted villages

Dr Murlidhar Sharma who sees patients in the villages adopted by the Village Outreach Programme saw 1285 patients. Another 358 patients walked into the hospital to consult the panel of specialists and 35 patients were admitted.





#### Delivering specialist's services remotely

Sewa International sponsored the operations of a mobile clinic for one year and specialists' visits to villages along its route. On April 29, Dr Pooja Kumari and Dr Ravinshu Hooda, DNB Ophthalmology residents, and paediatrician Dr Pankaj Gupta (see photograph above) served 73 residents of Vasa and Valoria.
