Blood banking

The Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank collected 1304 units of blood between October and December. Two blood donation drives arranged by the Vishwa Hindu Parishad, Reodar, and the Yuva Committee Abugarh Pargana, Gulab Ganj, yielded 152 and 103 units of blood respectively. During the quarter, the blood bank issued 22 units of whole blood, 1595 units of packed cells, 1425 units of fresh frozen plasma, 75 units of platelets and 3 units of cryoprecipitate.

Focus on capacity building

On December 22 and 23, associate directors at LV Prasad Eye Institute, Dr Srinivas Marmamula and Rajashekar Varada conducted a capacity building initiative under the aegis of their Sight Savers India Rural Eye Health Netra Vasan project. New ideas were discussed including strategy goals and expertism. The outcome of the discussion was a revised vision for the eyecare services: provide comprehensive high quality, affordable eyecare to all with dignity and respect. The participants also defined indicators that would be monitored to steer the operations in the right direction.

Sight Savers India also supported training in infection control practices by Dr Shagufta, an experienced facilitator. About 25 members attended the training on December 24 and 25. Dr Shagufta also explained the need to accredit the hospital.

Junior equipment maintenance engineer Ravinesh Mishra, biomedical department trainee Shekhar Raj and optometrists Ashwini Kumar Vishwakarma and Dhanajay Gabhane attended a training programme in the maintenance of ophthalmic equipment. This was organised by Vision 2020 The Right to Sight, at Sankara Nethralaya, Chennai, on November 19-20.



The Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind (Sightsavers) has supported the operations and expansion of Vision Centres in Kalandri and Reodar. Around World Sight Day (Oct 12), eye screening events attracted 3012 villagers, 459 were operated on for cataract. Screening touched the lives of 2112 pupils of six government schools in blocks Abu Road, Kalandri and Reodar. Children with refractive errors were given spectacles. Senior paediatric optometrist Santosh Anbhule and optometrists Rewat Garasia, Beena Chandravanshi and Shalu Hada led this activity.

Additionally, 823 pupils of the V.S. Mahaveer School and Mahatma Gandhi School in Jalore underwent eye checks. Jogeshwar Garg, MLA, Jalore, distributed 101 spectacles to children with refractive errors. Dr Amit Mohan, senior ophthalmologist, Shri Adinath Fateh Global Eye Hospital, Jalore, addressed the pupils on eye hygiene and digital eye strain. Dr Mohan also spoke on the theme 'love your eyes' for Lions Club members and others.

A rally to create eye awareness was inaugurated by additional superintendent of police Jalore Anukriti Ujjainia. More than 200 school students and the hospital employees covered the 3km-long route.



On December 30, 237 accredited social health activists (ASHAs) from Abu Road and Pindwada, in district Sirohi, and from Jalore were trained to identify cataract and visual impairments. Senior optometrist Dhaneshwar Deka and project coordinator Manish Sharma conducted the training.

Spectacular recovery of a bear maul victim

Shankar Singh, age 54, lives in Jawaingaon, an adopted village of the Village Outreach Programme.

Singh sustained injuries on his head and arm when he was mauled by a bear. At Global Hospital, a CT scan showed that he had dislocated his left maxillary medial incisor and left mandibular premolar teeth. He had contusion,

edema, laceration and a small acute hematoma in the right fronto temporo parietal scalp, infratemporal fossa and pre-zygomatic soft tissue. His arm had soft tissue contusion in the elbow joint. Consultant general and laparoscopic surgeon Dr Jayanta Bhownick performed debridement and multiple repairs of the extensive wound. A couple of months later, Singh had fully recovered.

Outreach by specialist

Consultant general and laparoscopic surgeon Dr Jayanta Bhowmick saw 27 patients in Reodar on November 24. He advised 10 patients to seek further treatment.

Reporting from the field

Dr Murlidhar Sharma who sees patients in the villages adopted by the Village Outreach Programme saw 1762 patients in the field while another 770 patients walked into the hospital to consult the panel of specialists and 26 patients were admitted.

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Focus on tuberculosis

Ninety five sputum samples were collected by field workers attached to the Village Outreach Programme over the quarter, of which 26 tested positive and seven patients were found to have extra pulmonary tuberculosis. Thirty-one patients recovered, 23 were referred.

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
