In India, they partnered the Rotary Club of Ahmedabad Riverfront (D3054), which was represented by the project chairman Rotarian Parag Fatehpuria, district governor Rotarian Balwant Singh Chirana and the DRFC Rotarian Lalit Sharma. The project was worth Rs 10 million.

The equipment included deep freezers, tube sealers, blood collection monitors, blood component extractors, donor couches, a chemiluminescence, centrifuge, etc.

Blood donation drives

The Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank collected 902 units internally and 517 units at four blood donation programmes, from 1419 donors. Against this, 883 patients were served. Close to one in four of the 1870 blood and blood components units issued was given for free. The Thalassemia Day Care Centre attached to the blood bank consumed 11%, the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma Centre consumed 7% and the remaining units were consumed externally.

About 180 people including workers of Modern Insulators and taxi drivers availed of free bone mineral density testing on October 14 and 26. Allied tests such as x-rays were subsidised. Consultant orthopaedician Dr Nithin Sunku attended to the patients.

The Lions Club of Abu Road Sangam and the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma

Centre jointly arranged a health check-up programme for 78 inmates of the local jail on November 28. Dr (P) Singh and Dr Uttam Singh prescribed and dispensed medicine.

Treating cataract in children

The Jiv Daya Foundation, a US-based not-for-profit, is covering the cost of high quality hydrophobic intraocular lenses from Alcon to be used for poor paediatric patients. Between April and December 2023 the hospital served 10 beneficiaries.

Maya Choudhary, age 10, is one such beneficiary. She is from village Bant in district Sirohi. Maya had never realised that she had a problem with her sight. It was her school teachers who saw her struggling to read the blackboard, and alerted her







parents. They suggested getting her eyes checked at the Global Hospital Institute of Ophthalmology where they knew that children were treated for nominal charges. Maya's father Jayantilal is a farmer owning a tiny land holding and 10 cows. He supports his wife and three children on his agricultural income.

Maya was diagnosed with Lamellar cataract in both of her eyes. Her right eye was worse off so it was taken up first. She successfully recovered and is looking forward to getting her second eye operated on too.

SightSavers supports capacitybuilding

SightSavers is supporting a capacity-building initiative of the Global Hospital Institute of Ophthalmology and the Shri Adinath Fateh Global Eye Hospital. This involves sponsoring the operational cost of two Vision Centres in Kalandari and Pindwara, the cost of conducting outreach programmes to screen people for cataract in

districts Sirohi and Jalore, and the wages of field workers and outreach programme coordinators attached to both these eyecare units. Netra Vasant, as the project is called, aims at eradicating preventable blindness in districts Sirohi and Jalore. Between April and December 2023, 976 people from district Sirohi underwent operations at Global Hospital Institute of Ophthalmology and 1125 people were similarly served at the Shri Adinath Fateh Global Eye Hospital.
