The former machine takes 3D images of the teeth, maxillofacial bones and nerves, providing a panoramic view of the teeth and jaws. The second machine is an automated, integrated system dedicated to glycosylated haemoglobin (HbA1c), thalassemia and haemoglobinopathy testing and screening.

SPINE SURGERY: A spine screening programme on January 4 held in collaboration with The Spine Foundation (Mumbai) attracted 94 patients, 36 from tribal areas like Nichlagarh, Panchdeval, Deldar, Udwaria, etc. Nineteen patients were from villages outside district Sirohi. Three patients were successfully operated on, on January 11.

BLOOD BANKING UPDATE

Just over half of the 1760 donors at the Rotary International Global Hospital Blood Bank over the quarter walked into nine blood donation programmes.

The largest drive yielded 380 units, this was organised by the Education Wing of the Rajyoga Education & Research Foundation.

Another initiative by Muslim Youth Committee yielded 173 units.

The bank prepared 3,641 units of blood and blood components, and issued 2,989 units to 896 patients, 14% within the hospital, and 23% for no charges.

NEUROSURGERY KICKS OFF

With the addition of Dr Amitendu Sekar, a senior neurosurgeon from Udaipur, to the team on February 17, neurosurgery services have restarted at the Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma Centre. Dr Sekhar is presently visiting the unit but is expected to transition to full time service soon. By the end of March he had been consulted by 145 patients and performed five neuro and spinal surgeries, including a minimally invasive spinal surgery, marking the first time such a complicated procedure had been performed in the district.

A neurosurgery case

A male patient, age 55 years, presented with severe pain in the back radiating to both legs up to the toes. He had been treated by multiple doctors.

Investigation showed that he had compression of the spinal nerve at L4/L5 by the disc. He was suggested nano technology-based minimally invasive spinal fusion surgery, by a percutaneous approach with an intra-operative microscope. The Radha Mohan Mehrotra Global Hospital Trauma Centre has all the equipment needed for this advanced procedure--the advanced microscope, high speed drilling system and intra-operative imaging system.

The patient felt the improvement immediately after the procedure and was discharged on the third day without any further complications.

EMPOWERING WOMEN

On the occasion of Women's Day 2025, the focus was on empowering and educating girls and women. Gynaecologist Dr Piyushi Sharma addressed about 74 students of the government secondary school in Abu Road, and about 60 women living nearby, on women's health. CREATING AWARENESS OF GLAUCOMA: On

the occasion of World Glaucoma Week in March, the staff of the Shri Adinath Fateh Global Eye Hospital delivered talks on the eye disease that is the most common cause of irreversible blindness.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES IN JALORE

Fifteen cataract screening programmes organised by the Shri Adinath Fateh Global Eye Hospital over the quarter attracted 2645 patients, of whom 1531 had their vision checked and 473 were found to need a cataract operation. Ophthalmologist Dr Rajesh Bishnoi operated on 241 patients while the remaining patients will need more motivation to visit the hospital for surgery.

One such patient was Shanti Devi, age 67, a resident of Navi, Jalore, who underwent a cataract operation of her right eye. Her treatment was sponsored by SightSavers India. Shanti Devi, a widow dependent on her son, a driver who barely manages to make ends meet, was extremely grateful for the free care.



Breast cancer screening and awareness

The Breast Cancer Screening and Awareness Centre, housed in the GV Modi Rural Health Centre, Abu Road, is targeting the early detection of breast cancer among nulliparous female volunteers of the Brahma Kumaris. Renowned cancer surgeon Dr Ashok Mehta is leading this project. A contribution from the Watumull Sanatorium Trust has covered the cost of equipment to screen for cancer.

Screening starts with a trained nurse checking for any palpable lumps, following which, she screens by means of a thermal camera. Thermal sensitivity images generate a B-score using artificial intelligence.

Thereafter, a digital mammogram is performed. A radiologist (presently, Dr Roja Tumma) analyses these images to detect early signs of breast cancer. If needed, she also performs a sonography.

Suspicious lesions are referred for a biopsy.

Between December 2024 when the service started and March 2025, 664 women were screened, of whom around 15 were found to have suspicious lesions and six cases proved to be cancerous on biopsy. The smallest cancerous lesion detected was 7mm.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Providing health consultations to socio-economically deprived village people through a mobile clinic

A community project sponsored by NewSpace India Limited, touched the lives of 3890 villagers between January and March.

Besides regular health consultations through a mobile clinic, visiting paediatrician Dr Kanistha Agarwal conducted health checks for 195 students of the government primary schools in Ghata Fali (Uplagarh), Nichli Fali (Uplagarh), Karma Fali (Nichalagarh), Nichli Bar (Nichalagarh) and Sangna (Khadat) between February 28 and March 7.

An awareness programme on safe motherhood in Uplagarh village on March 25 attracted 50 tribal women, including expectant mothers. Graduate nursing students from the Saroj Lalji Mehrotra Global Nursing College who speak the local dialect creatively simplified useful concepts.

Optometrists and field workers screened 156 villagers for cataract in six villages, of whom 45 were successfully operated on.

Senior students and teachers of the government secondary school in Jambudi, and villagers in Kalora were made aware of tuberculosis on World TB Day. Medical officer Dr Sanjay Dixit and programme coordinator Dr Ashok Dave encouraged people to help eradicate the disease.

Access to Primary Healthcare, a community programme sponsored by Siemens Healthineers, touched the lives of 4,536 villagers over the quarter.

The project covers provisioning a mobile health consultation service for a population of about 50,000, and screening for non-communicable diseases from August 2024 to March 2026.

Screening for respiratory diseases, particularly chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and asthma in village Ker on January 13 attracted 175 patients. A health awareness and screening programme in village Redwakala on January 22 attracted 143 women. On January 30, 121 villagers showed up for asthma, COPD, diabetes, hypertension and cataract screening in the remote tribal village Kala Mahadev Kheda.

Ninety patients were screened for suspicious lesions in the oral cavity and throat on World Cancer Day (February 4) in Surpagla. A women's health check programme in village Doitra on February 13 focused on breast and cervical cancers awareness and screening for 154 beneficiaries. Diabetes, hypertension, asthma, COPD

and cataract were in focus in village Jaydra on February 17. Each of the 82 adult beneficiaries had their blood pressure checked. Screening for oral cancer, diabetes, hypertension and orthopaedic ailments in Isara, on February 22, attracted 160 villagers.

A cervical cancer and breast cancer awareness and screening programme in village Paba, on International Women's Day (March 8), attracted 151 women. Eightythree people showed up for asthma, COPD, diabetes, hypertension and cataract screening in village Siyawa on March 25. An awareness and screening event for oral cancer, diabetes, hypertension, orthopaedic diseases and cataract saw 125 being examined in village Bhula on March 28.
